**I**n its 36 years the Dudgeon-Monroe Neighborhood Association has been instrumental in many significant improvements in this neighborhood by working with individuals, city officials and other civic organizations. We live, quite simply, in an increasingly wonderful neighborhood.

## PARKS & GARDENS

Help to plan and develop neighborhood park & garden spaces. Volunteer with friends for invasive weed pulling days; help develop short- and long-term plans for playground equipment, park benches, and ornamental landscapes throughout Dudgeon- Monroe.

## SOCIAL EVENT PLANNING

Chair: Vacant. Help foster relationship building with special social events like the winter wine tasting, spring pie and ice cream social, and autumn beer tasting. Develop new ideas, help organize events, set up and clean up for events, advertise, work with community businesses for donations, and more.

## NEIGHBORHOOD PLANNING & ZONING

Chair: Mike Florek, 255-6594. Develop expertise on current zoning and development issues, plan their best outcomes, and advise the Council about them. Represent the neighborhood interest by appearing before various city boards and commissions and, after consultation with the Council on major issues, present our views.

Coordinate membership outreach activities and help in neighborhood communication, annual membership drives, directory designing and printing, and newsletter distribution.

Select musical bands, obtain city authorizations, raise funds, coordinate tents and power, design and sell T-shirts, plan kids' activities, and handle publicity with local TV, radio, and print sources.
